Dias Vaults 18-1, Wants Record

FRESNO—On a night when everybody was looking for big things from Dan Ripley and Mike Tully, the man who cleared 18 feet in the pole vault was Vic Dias, the defend-

ing champion and meet record holder.
Dias, 27-year-old graduate of San Jose State, cleared 18-1 Saturday night in the West Coast Relays and promptly predicted he would break Dave Roberts' new world rec-

ord of 18-6½.

"I just need a stiffer pole," said Dias, a 6-2, 182-pounder who lives in Mira Loma, outside of Riverside, and repre-

sents the Beverly Hills Striders.
"Tve been ready to clear 18 feet for a long time. I did it in practice last year but then I chipped a bone in my foot. I knew I would do well tonight because I've been jumping 17-6 consistently in practice. I know I can break the world

record."

Dias took three tries at 18-7, and although he didn't

come close, he got most of his body over on the final try before crashing down on the bar.

It was a big night for jumping all around as strong, gusty winds which eventually turned Ratcliffe Stadium into a dust bowl pushed the athletes to some remarkable marks.

Olympic veteran Arnie Robinson treated the 15,000 fans to one of the finest long jump series in history, winning the event with a wind-aided 27-434. He had four consecutive jumps over 27 feet, all wind aided

The wind on his winning jump was 4.7 m.p.h., just over the allowable of 4.473 m.p.h. It's the best mark in the world this year, exceeding the wind-aided 27-4 by Charl-

ton Ehizuelen of Nigeria and the University of Illinois. In the triple jump, Milan Tiff of the Beverly Hills Striders rode the winds to an impressive 55-5 as the first six finishers all bettered 54 feet. USC's Tom Chochee set a school record of 54-44½ in placing fourth. UCLA's Willie Ranks was fifth.

On the track, the winds didn't help that much. The san-

dy-clay track, traditionally one of the fastest, was badly chewed up and the timing, for the first time, was electric, guaranteeing slower clockings. The electrical timing on Houston McTear's world record-equaling 9.0, for instance, was 9.3.

Jamaica's Don Quarrie won the 100 in 9.37 and UCLA's Clim Jackson took the high hurdles in 13.64. In both races the wind was legal.

USC made a sweep of the relays, winning the 440 in 39.85, the mile in a school record 3:06.31 and the two mile in 7:31.96. Ken Randle ran a 45.7 leg in the mile relay and broke open the 440 relay on the third leg.

UCLA sprinter Mike Bush pulled up in the 440 relay while running little of the anchor. "I don't know what we're going to do,"
said coach Jim Bush. "We're running out of healthy sprinters.
Next week in the Pac-8 we'll have to put Rick Wilmoth back in
there." Benny Brown ran a tremendous second leg to give UCLA
the lead in the 440 relay but USC's Randle got that back and more
on the third leg. Running the open 440 a few minutes later. Brown
had the race won but unaccountably eased off at the end, giving
the win to former teammate Mayle Parks.

USC's **Don Bryson** injured a knee in the triple jump and was in extreme pain but later managed to walk it off. "The trainer thinks he will be all right," said Wolfe.
