

Randy Williams Wins Long Jump, Then Runs 9.3

PULLMAN—USC's Randy Williams won the long jump at 26-4½, which was hardly a surprise. He also won his 100-yard dash heat in a wind-aided 9.3, which was—well, unbelievable.

So, Williams and the Trojans have a lot of momentum going for them today when the Pacific 8 track and field championships wind up at Washington State's Martin Stadium.

The Trojans will need all the momentum they can generate, because UCLA also made some big moves Friday and rate no worse than even-money with USC for the team title.

After seven events Friday, Oregon State was the leader with 42 points, followed by Oregon with 40. UCLA and Washington State had 39, followed by USC and Washington with 24.

UCLA was right on schedule, while USC was a little ahead of the game, thanks to a lifetime best of 17-3¼ by Tom DiStanislao in the pole vault. DiStanislao placed third behind Ron Mooers and Mike Tully of UCLA, who cleared the same height.

USC coach Vern Wolfe said, "We're looking a little better than we did when the day started. Randy, of course, gave us a real lift. I couldn't believe it when he went by me. I said, 'Who is that?' Then I realized he was in the heat."

Williams, off to a sensational start, not only surprised with his clocking but he beat the people who are picked 1-2 in the final, USC's James Gilkes and Washington's Pablo Franco.

"If I get another start like that to-

morrow," said Randy, "who knows?"

UCLA coach Jim Bush, appraising his team's chances, said, "We're in good shape . . . but so is USC. If anybody rates an edge, it's the Trojans, because they have a lot of people going tomorrow, particularly in the hurdles.

USC qualified four in the high hurdles and three in the intermediate hurdles.

The Trojans also figure to score heavily in the sprints. Gilkes won his 220 heat in a wind-aided 20.4 and Ken Randle took his with a lifetime best of 20.5. Randle was not all-out.

In the long jump, Williams won it on his first jump, then had his shoe rip apart on his second jump which also was over 26 feet. When he went to run the 100, he had to borrow a pair from intermediate hurdler Rich Graybehl.

"Remind me to wear the same pair tomorrow," Randy grinned.

Williams' win in the long jump was his fourth straight in the conference, joining him with Oregon distance runner Steve Prefontaine and California half miler Rick Brown as the Pacific 8's only four-time winners.

Track Notes

The weather was clear and crisp with temperatures in the 60s . . . The rubberized asphalt track was getting some knocks before the meet but it produced fast clockings. "I like it," said UCLA hurdler **Clim Jackson**. "It gets you to that first hurdle fast." Jackson eased off in his heat, letting USC's **Mike Johnson** get the win. "I did it," said Jackson, "so I would get one of the outside lanes in the final. There's going to be a lot of thrashing of arms in the middle lanes, and I'd just as soon be clear of it."

UCLA's **Kent Pagel** had a lifetime best of 61-10 to place second in the shot . . . USC's **Russ Rogers** had a narrow miss at 17-3/4 on his second vault . . . DiStanislaio's pre-

vious best was 16-6. "I'm on a stiffer pole and I've been getting a lot of help from Coach Wolfe," said the 6-4, 195-pound sophomore from Newport Beach. Said Wolfe: "If Tom hadn't been out three weeks with mononucleosis, I honestly believe he would be doing 18 feet now." . . . Mooers said, "I'm looking for 18 feet my next time out, which will be in the NCAA." That's June 5-7 in Provo, Utah.

Williams, on the jump when he ripped his shoe: "I think I would have done over 27 feet, because I hit the board much harder than I did on my first jump." . . . UCLA's **Jerry Herndon**, fourth in the long jump, on teammate **Willie Banks** who finished fifth: "He had one foul jump that was over 27 feet. He's just learning the event. When he does, look out! He's got the same kind of spring **Bob Beamon** had." . . . Williams' fastest legal 100 is 9.6. In Friday's race, Gilkes got a horrible start, then collared Franco five yards from the finish but couldn't quite get to Williams . . . UCLA's **Rory Kotinek** did not compete in the javelin which was contested the same time as the long jump.
