

Enyeart Beats 880 Mark Set in 1955 by Spurrier

BERKELEY (AP)—Utah State half-miler Mark Enyeart broke a 20-year-old stadium record with a 1:47.2 victory and Jim Bolding saved a group of world record-holders from being shut out at the Meet of Champions Saturday.

Enyeart's time bettered the 1:47.5—a world record when run in 1955—of former University of California star Lon Spurrier.

The Pacific Coast Club's Bolding won the 440-yard intermediate hurdles in 49.8 seconds, also an Edwards Stadium record.

Two other world record-holders, shot putter Al Feuerbach and high jumper Dwight Stones, failed to win their events. And discus record-holder John Powell arrived too late to compete, after being stuck in a traffic jam.

Feuerbach put the shot 64-6¾ while Sam Walker won at 64-11½. Dennis Adama, formerly of Indiana, won the high jump at 7-2.

Miler Marty Liquori finished fourth in a field led by Kenyan Wilson Waigwa of the University of Texas

El Paso, who was timed in 4:00.4. Liquori ran 4:01.6.

France's Olympic medalist, Guy Drut, won the 120-yard high hurdles, edging North Carolina Central's Charles Foster, the only man to beat Drut last year. Drut and Foster were timed in 13.3 seconds, equaling the stadium record set by world record-holder Rod Milburn and Earl McCulloch.

The meet here was co-sponsored by the U.S. Track and Field Federation and the University of California.

Benny Brown, UCLA's NCAA 440 champion, won his specialty easily in 46.5 seconds after earlier helping rival USC win the 440 relay. Brown ran the second leg on a relay team dubbed the Southern California Collegians, joining the Trojans' Randy Williams, Ken Randle and James Gilkes. The hybrid team beat the Beverly Hills Striders by one-tenth of a second in 40.1.

There were only two women's events on the program and they followed form as American record-holder Patty Van Wolvelaere took the 100-meter high hurdles in 13.9 and Francie Larrieu, another American record-holder, won the mile in 4:43.3.

Gulf-Fords Take Le Mans Lead

LE MANS, France (AP)—Two British Gulf-Fords led the 24 hour Le Mans endurance classic Sunday at the halfway point.

As if to illustrate what could still rob them of victory, the second best Gulf-Ford developed electrical problems after the fifth hour, dropped to fifth place but fought its way back to second again.

Jackie Ickx of Belgium and Britain's Derek Bell drove the No. 1 Gulf faultlessly and developed a four-lap lead over the nearest car before their teammates, Australian Vern Schuppan and Frenchman Jean Pierre Jaussaud, went back into second place.

The challenge to the Gulfs came from three French Ligiers and a Porsche 908. For hours, the leading Gulf was followed in second place by Reinhold Jost and Mario Casoni in the Porsche. One Ligier dropped out after a collision, and another stopped in the pits and went from fourth to 21st. The remaining Ligier held on behind the Porsche 908 as night fell.

But then, near the halfway point, both the Porsche and the leading Ligier of Jean Louis Lafosse and Guy Chasseuil went into the pits in quick succession, and the Gulfs were back on top.
