SCOTT BLAZES MILE IN 3:57.8

IRVINE—Steve Scott, UC Irvine's world class distance runner, won the mile in the world class time of 3:57.8 here Sunday in the Meet of Champions.

That would seem to be a pretty good accomplishment for one windy afternoon. But Scott said he'd also run the 800 meters—"just for a workout."

Some workout. He bolted from fourth in the last 100 meters to run down USC's David Omwansa and Lloyd Johnson and UCLA's Grant Niederhaus to win in 1:48.1.

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20-year-old Scott, who also happens to be in a class by himself. He's an outstanding American miler (there aren't many of them) in an event dominated by foreigners.

Scott's 3:57.8 mile—the first time he has been under four minutes outdoors-was noteworthy inasmuch as he ran

virtually without opposition and had to set his own pace. "It thought I was going to have some fantastic competi-tion—people like Wilson Waigwa, Niall O'Shaughnessy and Paul Cummings," said Scott, who resembles John Walker, the world mile record holder (3.49.4) from New Zealand. "But they couldn't make it to the meet. So I didn't

think I'd have a super time—just run well enough to win.
"But, when no one went out fast the first 30 yards, thought I'd do it and see how it felt. There was something
