Wilkins Upset; Moses Pressed

Mac Wilkins, the Olympic champion and world record holder in the discus, was beaten by an old adversary, John Powell, and another Montreal gold medal winner, Edwin Moses, was almost upset in the 400meter intermediate hurdles Saturday at the 19th annnal Mt. San Antonio College Relays.

Moses hit the first hurdle, awkwardly high jumped the last barrier and just had enough to edge Sam Turner, a sophomore at Cal State Los Angeles. Moses was timed in 49.9, Turner in 50 flat.

Moses, who set the world record at 47.64 in Montreal, wasn't in a mood to talk to reporters after the race. However, he did say, "I haven't run on a track like *this* since high school."

He was referring to Mt. SAC's dirt

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track in contrast to the more popular Tartan surfaces.

Powell beat Wilkins on his last throw-a 219-2 effort after Wilkins led at 216-11. Powell, who says he's a vegetarian now, tried to play down his long rivalry with Wilkins, But you his long rivalry with Winnins. But you know it's on his mind because he said he now holds a 20-17 competition edge over the Olympic champion. Wilkins broke the world record

four times last year, settling for a best of 232-6. Powell is the former record holder at 226-8

The two huge discus throwers got some unexpected help from a much bigger man. Wilt Chamberlain, the track nut, was marking their throws.

Otherwise, nothing startling happened on a warm, slightly smoggy day but there were some creditable performances, namely;

-Dedy Cooper of San Jose State. the defending NCAA champion, beat a class field in the 110-meter hurdles. He caught Olympian Willie Davenport at the ninth hurdle and won in

USC's Mike Johnson was fourth and UCLA's Greg Foster fifth in a prep for their showdown race next Saturday in the climactic dual meet between the schools, UCLA's James Owens pulled out of the race at the last minute because of a slight groin strain. The injury isn't considered serious

-Steve Riddick of the Philadelphia Pioneers, the indoor sprint sensation with 13 straight victories, was nothing less than sensational in running the anchor leg in the 400-meter relay. He started from almost a dead stop, made up about four yards on Randy Williams of the Tobias Striders and won easily. His team ran 39.33, noteworthy on any track.

-Mike Boit of Kenya, a Stanford graduate student, drew appreciative gasps from the crowd with his fluid running style in the 800 meters. He didn't even seem to extend himself in winning in 1:47.2. —USC's Joel Andrews showed that

his 46 flat 400 meters last week at Berkeley was no fluke as he won the race in 46.46. He had to hold off Hubert Beasley of Long Beach State in a tight stretch duel. Andrews was doubled over with stomach cramps after the race but is expected to be ready for UCLA.

-Bill Collins of the Hurricane TC won the 100-meters in 10.22 with the aid of a 5.81 m.p.h. wind (all flat races were helped along by breezes). Hous-ton McTear of Santa Monica City, who ran 10 flat recently, wasn't in the race, running in the relays, instead.

-Milan Tiff of the Tobias Striders took the triple jump at 55-2 as Willie Banks of UCLA was beaten for the first time this season. He was fourth at 53-101/2.
