Sanford Seeks a Record, Asks Help From the Wind

SEATTLE—It seems that it is only a matter of time before USC's James Sanford breaks the world record in the 100 meters

The Trojan senior has been exceptionally sharp the past few weeks in pursuit of Jimmy Hines' world mark of 9.95 set at Mexico City in the 1968 Olympic Games.

Sanford ran a wind-aided 9.88 in the USC-UCLA dual, then a 10.03 in the UCLA-Pepsi Invitational and a hand-timed 10 flat in a meet in Trinidad.

His times weren't that impressive (for him) in the 100 and 200 trials of the Pacific 10 track and field met Friday night at Husky Stadium, but he was eased up in both sprints and still clocked 10.39 and 21.06. Moreover, he was running into a head wind.

"I'm loose and feeling better than ever," Sanford said. "If the wind dies down tomorrow (the finals), who knows? I like this track (a Chavelle surface). It's a fast one."

Sanford, the world's No. 1 ranked sprinter in 1979, is apparently in a class by himself this year. He could be pushed by UCLA's Greg Foster, the defending NCAA 200 champion, in today's 200 finals, but UCLA Coach Jim bush doesn't want Foster to make an all-out effort.

"I've almost begged Greg not to go after Sanford in the 200," Bush said. "I told him to let Sanford get his 10 points (first place) and that eight points (second) is a lot of points. But I don't know if he's going to go along with me."

Foster, the best high hurdler in the world now that Renaldo Nehemiah is recovering from an ankle injury, hasn't worked out much recently. He is favoring his right leg that he injured a month ago.

So Bush doesn't want Foster to strain himself while trying to beat Sanford, risking a permanent injury that would keep him out of the NCAA meet June 5-7 at Austin. Tex.

Foster, like Sanford, was eased up in winning his heats in the 110-meter high-furdles (13.75) and 200 (20.85). He was literally under wraps because he was wearing leotards.

Bush bought several pairs of leotards Friday morning for his runners to wear to protect them against possible cold weather. The temperature
