## Lewis' 9.93 Run Is Gone With Wind

Carl Lewis has said that a sub-10-second time in the 100 meters is definitely possi-



ble at sea level and that Jim Hines' world record of 9.95, set at high altitude, may not endure much longer.

Lewis, the current world's fastest human. went under 10 seconds Sunday in the Mt. San Antonio Relays at Walnut with a 9.93 clocking that just missed being a legal mark. He was aided by a wind of 2.3 meters per second; the allowable limit is 2.0.

It was an auspicious outdoor debut for Lewis. who has apparently corrected an erratic start. He got off at least even with the other sprinters, fought off Ron Brown at 70 meters and won by a about a meter. Brown, an Arizona State wide receiver, was second at 10.01 with Willie Gault of Tennessee third at 10.08.

Hines' record was set in the favorable high altitude of Mexico City at the 1968 Olympic Games. Lewis has the fastest 100 meters at sea

level - 10.00 twice.

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
